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1st QUARTER MEETING OF NA LEI MAKALAPUA The Mainland Council of Hawaiian **Civic Clubs** March 1-3, 2024 Santa Ana. CA

It was a solemn gathering as the Lei of the MCAHCC gathered. Just week prior unexpected news came announcing the passing of Carol Nalani Johnson - it was also unexpected to her. As representatives from Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Utah, Nevada, Tennessee, California and Hawai'i convened a memorial was staged by Hope Pelekikena Mua Marlene Livesay, Kipuka Ola Pelekikena Charlene Lui and CA hosting coordinator Charlene Kazner MCAHCC secretary. The presentation drew tears from one and all as it was disclosed that Aunty Carol had begun planning this 1 Quarter meeting since the ending of AHCC Convention in October 2023. Knowing that this gathering would be the first MCAHCC in person meeting since 2020 -the COVID years, Aunty Carol worked tirelessly to secure funding to cover all travel, hotel stay and food for the clubs. She secured \$70,000 from Kipuka Ola Native Hawaiian Resources and Keola (a private Foundation) with the help of Charlene Lui and Tee Furtado. Along with the funding enlisted presenters CEO Dr. Sheri-Ann Daniels of Papa Ola Lokahi and Dr. Sylvia Hussey of Pueo Consulting and former CEO of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. Both came forward to sound accolades of Aunty Carol and the months of numerous phone calls and emails to fine tune in, her eyes, a momentous gathering of and for the Mainland Council. A most poignant moment came when Charlene Lui recalled going to Aunty Carol's home to collect records for the Mainland Council: "When I went into her home. I found organized folders and copies made for all the officers, Board Members, and component clubs. It broke my heart knowing how much she was looking forward to the meeting, anxiously preparing and so excited to announce the funding. In her last year as MCAHCC Pelekikena she wanted this meeting to be her legacy." Indeed it was.

PRESENTATION & WORKSHOP

PAPA OLA LOKAHI – Condition of Hawaiians in Hawai'i and on the Continent: Papa Ola Lōkahi is the Native Hawaiian organization primarily responsible for the statutory implementation of the Native Hawaiian Healthcare Improvement Act and other federal and state regulations.

Dr. Sheri-Ann Daniels conducted the first presentation. Having just returned from conferences in Washington D.C. as well as with the White House Initiative on Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders, her report was urgent and direct. Now is the time for Hawaiians on the continent to voice their presence loud and clear to their respective States in the Union. Our communities must be vocal to claim available funds and services that are being set to support the growing Native Hawaiian population. But, we (MCAHCC) must do the work and lead our communities to the "wai" water. The diaspora of Hawaiians leaving Hawai'i has raised awareness on all Federal agencies' levels and in warning, allocation of services and funding to Native Hawaiian agencies may diminish in Hawai'i as the numbers in population who need servicing lowers. Taking note, Native Hawaiian agencies such as Papa Ola Lokahi in return are requesting more funding with large portions of these funds directed to assist/train Hawaiian communities on the continent to unite and advocate for needed assistance from the States. Dr. Daniels sees the MCAHCC as the best recipient of these funds as our organization is the longest and savviest to advocate for Native Hawaiians. According to Dr. Daniels, Papa Ola Lokahi has initiated funding tracks to Kipuka Ola Native Hawaiian Resources with request that our component clubs submit funding requests through Kipuka being most direct and expedient. The funds were specifically directed for MCAHCC usage.

The MCAHCC workshop was supported by a grant from Papa Ola Lōkahi as an opportunity to strengthen our MCAHCC organizations:

- Kipuka Ola Native Hawaiian Resources (Kipuka Ola)
- MCAHCC Nā Lei Makalapua Mainland Council
- 17 Mainland Hawaiian Civic Clubs (HCC)

An intensive and dynamic workshop was presented and steered by Dr. Sylvia Hussey for 2 days. Her company Pueo Consulting provides a broad range of education and business expertise support in the varied areas: administration; governance; leadership; management; organizational structure; strategic, tactical and operational planning, projections and execution; education and leadership program design and evaluation; research; bookkeeping and financial statement and report preparation; audit preparation and support; and event, project and program management.

The workshop was an "engine" check on the condition of the MCAHCC. It was surely was needed as clubs revealed issues of purpose sustaining and increasing membership financial instability need for leadership recruitment, training and sustainment making room for 'opio and kupuna descension and disruptions in clubs

Professionally delivered, the workshop provided answers and addressed possible solutions to the questions posed.

The handouts were truly valuable and I look to see if we can post them on our LVHCC website for members to peruse.







To meet the growing healthcare needs, HPU is launching two new degrees: Doctor of Occupational Therapy and Doctor of Physical Therapy. The inaugural student cohort for the Occupational Therapy (OT) program will begin August 2024 and Physical Therapy (PT) in January 2025. Both programs are hybrid and accelerated in nature, that allows both programs to be delivered online and in-person and all in two years! Gail Wright Hoʻopaʻa Moʻolelo (Historian)

Na A'a Mo'aukala (Historical Roots) by Gail Wright & Pat Filbert



The recent Las Vegas Superbowl saw recognition of several Lahainaluna High School football team seniors and their coaches after the fires on Maui. They also served as honorary coin toss captains for the game. Recognizing them takes us back in history to recognize the first Native Hawaiian Football Player.

John Henry Wise was born in 1868 in Kohala, Moku e Keawe and attended Hilo Boarding School until moving to Kamehameha School for

Boys. In 1890, the Hawaiian Evangelical Association raised funds to send him to Oberlin Theological College in Ohio, U.S., near the Great Lakes. After arriving, he soon realized how cold it gets there and wrote in a letter, "Please send more money, I need more long underwear. It's freezing in the Great Lakes."

Wise was recruited as a member of the new Oberlin College football team in 1891. The team wasn't very good in the first year. In 1892, things changed with the arrival of a coach who worked for free as the school couldn't afford to pay him. This coach took the team on to become one of the best in the U.S. with John Wise as the star. The name of the coach? John Heisman, the man the Heisman Trophy is named after that's given annually to the best college football player in the nation.

In 1893 Wise received news of the overthrow of the Hawaiian Monarchy, comes home, and sides with the Hawaiian Royalists during the Wilcox Rebellion in 1895. He gets arrested and spends three years in prison. When he got out, he helped found Ka Makua Mau Loa Church which conducts its teachings in 'Olelo Hawai'i. He worked with former Prince David Kawānanakoa at the 1900 Democratic National Convention and, in 1920, was a territorial senator and is credited along with Prince Kūhio for pushing the Hawaiian Home Lands Act through Congress. Wise then began translating Hawaiian legends for the Bishop Museum and taught 'Olelo Hawai'i at Kamehameha Schools and then University of Hawai'i.

Wise passed away in 1937. UH honored him by naming the school's athletic field after him. Wise's legacy lived on through his 'Ohana, with his son Bill as a football all-star at UH who later coached his own athletic sons to many victories at Kamehameha. Wise's great-grandson, Les Hutchins, former lineman at Pearl City High School in the 1970s, believes Wise deserves a place in the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame.

PAT'S HEALTH ARTICLE

"No Hawaiian leader wants to lead a nation of sick Kānaka."—Hawai'i Island activist Palikapu Dedman, 1998. Sage words. History shows that for more than 2,000 years, Hawai'i supported a population of Kānaka who were healthy, living in a state of lōkahi and pono, and focused on physical, mental, and spiritual wellbeing. Why? Maintaining healthy bodies and minds was a requirement as their lives depended on staying uninjured, mobile, and strong to maintain their culture and keep their 'Ohana safe.

Today, the ease of getting cheap and unhealthy food, smoking and vaping, and favoring being on your phone and not being active (slowly wandering in the park looking at your phone is not true exercise!) has led many to become chronically ill and pushed being overweight as a national health crisis. The high-availability of poor food choices are problems that allow for dietary over-consumption and empty-calories.

This results in chronic heart disease, stroke, cancer, diabetes, and atherosclerosis are directly related to poor food choices and food excesses. In seeking remedies to obesity, the 'Ohana is viewed as the critical player. Potential 'Ohana solutions can be avoiding fast foods, making and eating healthy meals, and engaging in physical activities as a family (NOT INCLUDING sitting in a movie theater eating popcorn, nachos, and hotdogs while drinking an Icee) to make lasting memories.

Being overweight is the first step toward the health problems harms listed above that can and do shorten your life. Add alcohol and the list of risks grows longer. Importantly, being overweight signals to us that change is needed to avoid greater harm. Harm that comes from leaving your 'Ohana far too soon or, worse, placing high costs of your care on your 'Ohana. This causes stress which affects their health.

Becoming active through daily exercise and changing food choices can begin to address concerns of overweight individuals. The ancestral diet was almost 80% vegetables, including, taro, lū'au, palula, poi, sweet potato, 'ulu, greens and limu. Today, everyone eats too much meat; particularly processed meats (Spam, hotdogs, sausages, etc.) which adds up to two times the protein that the ancestors ate. Fish is far superior to canned meats, sausage, pork, or egg protein.

It takes will power and a conscious decision to eat right and be physically active. Many people let other concerns (pilikia!) get in the way. They work hard, focus on caring for others, and forget about taking care of themselves. Remembering you need to be healthy to care for others requires setting aside time to do that. It also requires you put those phones, vapes/cigarettes, bad food down, get out there, and be physical.

Creating memories as an 'Ohana means getting outside and actually doing that and instead of "heads down, looking at the small screen." Physical activity is very important to our wellbeing, whether it's through cultural practices like hula and lomilomi or simply enjoying a walk out in nature. So is prioritizing regular check-ups and talking about health challenges to create a supportive network.

"Take a break from your pilikia!" Problems drive our decisions and outlook on life. Don't let problems occupy your thoughts to the point of creating endless worry, anxiety, and stress. You control what you do so challenging yourself with new experiences and skills—confronting your pilikia head-on means not adding preconditions to everything. You don't like exercising? Take the dog for a walk. Slack off on your diet? Include healthier foods in your meals. Change your mindset from "there's nothing I can do about it" to "what can I do to fix this issue?"

Every huaka'i (journey) starts with the first step. So start walking!


